Dear Homer Congregational Family,

Over the first weekend of June I participated in the New York Conference's Annual Meeting which was held at the Silver Bay Conference Center on Lake George, New York. I was joined by your delegates, Vicki Johnson and Belinda Burtner; along with, Minister in Discernment, Rachel Ditch.

The weekend was in a glorious setting and filled with uplifting worship and reports of God's work around our Conference. It also included a challenge to confront the ongoing reality of racism in our nation, our state and our churches. In my sermon this past Sunday (6/21) I quoted from our Conference Minister, the Reverend David Gaewski's State of the Conference address. This address was prophetic in light of the horrific killings that took place at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina on June 17. The following is an excerpt from his message and a challenge to us all. The entire message can be read on the Conference's website. www.uccny.org/news.

For those who have never been to our office, the signage of "United Church of Christ" and now additional the banner "Black Lives Matter" is easily visible to the thousands of cars that drive by each day. [Referring to a visitor's criticism of the banner] In her rant, the young woman informed the staff that her husband was a law enforcement officer. How dare we criticize one who puts his life on the line to protect our community? How dare we not have a sign that simply read "All Lives Matter"? Of course she is right. All lives matter.

- In 1998 when Matthew Sheppard was brutally beaten, tortured and left to die in Laramie, Wyoming, gay lives matter.
- In 1942 when then President Franklin D. Roosevelt authorized the deportation and incarceration of Japanese Americans, Asian lives matter.
- In the 1930's when Jew's were marched into gas champers in Nazi-controlled Germany, Jewish lives matter.
- When Palestinians are herded like cattle and forced off the land they live on, Palestinian lives matter.
- When NYPD police officers Wenjian Liu and Rafael Ramos were senselessly shot and killed, Law Enforcement lives matter.
- When thousands upon thousands of women today suffer silently with domestic violence, women's lives matter.

When the troubled lives of Malissa Williams and Timothy Russell ended in a car chase during which Cleveland police shot 132 bullets in to their vehicle... And when 12 year old Tamir Rice holding a toy gun, sitting on a park swing is shot to death two seconds after police arrive upon a report that a black man, who was probably a juvenile was pointing a gun at people... And when in the past four years, not including deaths in 2015, unarmed mostly young black men are killed by police such as: . . . [43 names were mentioned with candles lit] . . . This is when Black Lives Matter. Yes All Lives Matter. And Yes, we have a crisis in our society that calls us to proclaim Black Lives Matter.

My prayer and hope is that we will be a part of living out the inclusive love of God.

Discussion of financial dire straits

from the Board of Trustees and Church Moderator

The Homer Congregational Church, our church, in intimate association with the First Religious Society in the Town of Homer, has a long history of serving God with Worship, Education, and Mission. We are a generous congregation that has and continues to support that work, and each other. However, we are also a victim of the general decline in church attendance and we have not yet recovered from some of the changes that have occurred in the church. As a result, our pledges have struggled to keep up with our basic expenses. We are blessed with a rich Endowment Fund and we all recognize the need to nurture those funds so that they will be able to provide the church with the most future value. We have recently looked closer at some of the ways our church works, including the purpose and uses of the Endowment Fund and recognized that using a portion of the Endowment Fund to support a Capital Project Fund is appropriate.

However, other uses are unclear and opinions on spending range from "no other uses" to "let's fund lots of mission projects". We have a responsibility to continue to God's work, which means that we must provide for worship, maintain the ability to educate our children, and conduct missions. In order to thrive and grow we must also have the facilities and activities to attract new members. This reality gives us cause to re-examine our assets and assess if it will be necessary to consider using some of the Endowment Fund to survive. It does not seem to be wise to close our doors while a fund clearly intended to support the church remained. It is true that each time we remove money from the Endowment Fund, it reduces its overall value and retards its growth rate, but does not eliminate the fund, which will continue to grow at a rate determined by its value.

Our church leadership is spending time discerning when and under what circumstances we would consider turning to the Endowment Fund. They consider our proportion of pledges and expenses and at times prioritize the payment of bills and services. If we do not pay our bills, basic facilities will be lost. Those may be building and facility support, our ability to carry out mission

work, or the loss of critical staff needed to provide for worship and education. Loss of any or all of these things will remove our ability to attract and retain new members, which is truly the only real solution to our financial difficulties. If pledged income does not meet expenses, and appeals for additional donations are not sufficient, and creative new ways of raising money do not yield enough to close the gap, what options are we left with?

As we continue to consider these conditions and weigh various solutions, it is hoped that being proactive can prevent more difficult decisions in our future. We believe that God wishes us to continue functioning as his church, our church. We also believe that he expects us to listen to him and to make the decisions that will make best use of the blessings he has bestowed upon us to keep the church open and make it a vibrant reflection of his wishes for us and our community.

Bell Choir News


When you read this, our group of handbell ringers will have returned from the Area II Young Ringers

We all knew that just three days before our meeting, the 70th anniversary of D-Day had been commemorated with several services all around our nation. Many of us did not know, however, that at the World War II Memorial in Washington, D. C. a plaque or inscription had been installed just a few years ago honoring the words that FDR prayed with our nation on June 6, 1944. Some of you may remember FDR'S prayer, which was read to our nation by radio address when 156,000 American, British, and Canadian forces landed on five beaches along a 50-mile stretch of the heavily fortified coast of France's Normandy region. At our meeting, we heard some of this extraordinary prayer whose words have now been immortalized on the World War II Memorial. The prayer now becomes a permanent reminder of the sacrifice of not just those who fought in World War II but also of the men and women who fight for us today and lay down their lives for the cause of liberty.

Our special guest was Kathy McKenna who delighted us all with her explanation of how she grows gourds and makes amazing items from them. She harvests them but then they have to just sit for a long time and dry out before she can work with them. She makes birdhouses, vases of all sizes and shapes, snowmen, jack o'lanterns (snowmen and jack o'lanterns had lights in them). The gourd-type jack o'lanterns do not get rotten like pumpkin types

do. There were piggy banks for children and other items shaped like animals. She had a table displaying many items which we could look at and ask questions about.

Kathy paints designs on her gourds using an acrylic-type paint. She also embellishes her gourds from things she finds in nature...different grasses, sticks, grapevines, etc. We were all most impressed by her creativity and ingenuity and can't imagine how she finds time for anything else with her dedication to this hobby. Her presentation was excellent and informative, and Kathy graciously answered lots of questions. She also had a little plant with a gourd for each of us to take home. We could not believe it when she said each plant might yield 10 gourds. Several of Kathy's items are on display for sale at Cinch in Cortland. Many thanks, Kathy, for your most enjoyable discussion and sharing your hobby with us

Result of the Special Meeting May 31, 2015

The following change to the By-laws of the First Religious Society in the Town of Homer was approved at a Special Meeting of the Society on May 31, 2015. This language is a revision of the original proposal presented to the Society at the 2015 Annual Meeting.

A Building Fund shall be established by the Board of Trustees for the sole purpose of carrying out *major capital projects*. An amount of ½% of the Permanent Fund shall be deposited annually into the Building Fund if the following two conditions are met: first, the Permanent Fund average value (previous five quarters) as of February 1st must exceed \$2,000,000 and second, the Building Fund value is less than \$100,000. Major Capital Projects are defined as, new construction, expansion, renovation, repair or replacement project of facilities with a life expectancy of ten years or longer, where the total cost must exceed \$10,000; or purchase of major equipment costing at least \$10,000 with a life expectancy of at least ten years.


