To Homer Congregational Church:

As you receive this newsletter you will be preparing for a new year. Happy New Year! You will soon say good bye to the old and welcome in the new. The events of 2015 will have passed into the history books, and a new year — fresh, full of promise and uncertainty — will be

welcomed in.

Most of us have our own rituals for bringing in the New Year. For some, the birth of the New Year means a party with friends. For others, New Year's Eve is spent watching football games or watching a ball in Time Square fall or going to a celebration with friends or staying up until midnight and kissing the one we love. For others we go to sleep wondering what all the fuss is about.

We all have our rituals. We have our rituals of church life and home life and work life. Often the rituals of our daily lives seem much removed from God. For some, the church ritual has been reduced to worship attendance at Christmas and Easter and to socially required ceremonies such as baptisms, weddings and funerals. There isn't an expectation of something new and dynamic that captures our interest. For others, there is restlessness and longing to encounter God in a fresh way, for the transcendent God to enter into our daily routine.

The Gospels tell us of individuals who in the midst of their daily routine had "divine interruptions." Joseph had a "divine interruption" as an angel of God spoke to him during a dream. Mary, the mother of Jesus, had a "divine interruption" as an angel announced that she was going to give birth to the Christ child. The wise men had a "divine interruption" as God used a star to provide celestial direction. In each case they responded to the direction they were given and were transformed as a result.

Many Americans go through the ritual of making New Years Resolutions: lose weight, exercise more, spend more time with your children and grandchildren, save more money. I, too, have the habit of making resolutions each year. My resolutions have included very healthy tasks: pray more, read through the Bible, be more outspoken about my faith, be a better mom and now grandmother. This year I want to make sure I include the invitation for God to break into my well-planned agenda at anytime with a "divine interruption." I want to ensure I am always open for God to totally change my plans and replace it with God's plans. I can't think of a more obvious example of God adjusting my plans than the unexpected birth of my grandson, Austin. The transcendent God entering into my daily rituals with a "divine interruption" and what a blessing he has been!!!

Where is God in all of our plans for welcoming in the New Year? What is God calling us to be and do as individuals and as a congregation? I believe that Jesus Christ is in our midst and He calls us both from the **manger** and from the **cross** to be open for God to break through the ritual and routine of our lives and give new meaning to our every endeavor.

Without God, our rituals and more specifically the ritual of our congregational lives are merely the passing of the old year into another just like it. Let's expect together many "divine interruptions." By God's grace we can claim 2016 as A.D. 2016, "the year of our Lord."

Transition Team Update

Below you will find some of the results from the *US Congregational Life Survey* that many participated in September. Copies of the survey results are available in the office or from any member of the Transition

Team. Thanks to those who gave their feedback during two gatherings in December. The Transition Team will present their Congregational and Community Assessment following the worship service on **January 17**. Please plan to be in attendance. Following this presentation addition work will focus on responding to the Assessment with ascertaining what God calling us to do and what type of pastor will lead us into the future? These questions require a willingness to learn anew the purpose of the church and we hope you are up for the challenge!

The Survey Says:

Summary based on US Congregational Life Survey Report

Building Spiritual Connections: The results indicate 44% of the people who completed the survey spend time every day in private devotional activities. And although 60% feel that HCC meets their spiritual needs; these percentages are lower than the national average for United Church of Christ congregations (82%). Sixty-five percent of worshipers prefer traditional hymns (74% UCC national average); 37% prefer contemporary hymns (21% UCC national average); 16% prefer praise music or choruses (24% UCC national average). Worshipers indicated (13%) are less likely to say their spiritual growth comes from involvement in this congregation. It was agreed that a greater focus on spiritual growth would benefit the entire congregation.

Building Inside Connections: Sixty-six percent of those surveyed participate in some form of congregational leadership (such as governing board, committee, choir or usher, etc.) which is higher than the UCC national average (59%). With this high percentage of involvement, it is important to expand the pool of leaders and match people's service with interest and gifts. Seventy-six said some or all of

their close friends attend HCC. While this strong sense of connection provides stability and can be seen as an assets; some wondered if these connections inhibited the retention and integration of newcomers. In the area of financial support, 8% indicated that they gave 10% or more of their net income to the church which is lower than the UCC national average of 13%. Because of pastoral transition the questions regarding the match between pastor and congregation was not considered.

Building Outside Connections: In the past twelve months 27% invited a friend or relative who does not attend a congregation to a worship service. This is below the UCC national average (40%). The percentage of those who have attended worship services for five years or less (18%) is below the UCC national average (24%) and 70% of the congregation have attended for ten years or more, higher than the national average (61%). This information emphasized the need for effective outreach and retention of visitors. While personal conversation is the most effective outreach tool, expanding the use of technology to reach those outside the church was mentioned. Only ten percent of responders indicated that they regularly take part in any activities of this congregation that reach the wider community. This reflects a lack of a direct mission to the community on behalf of our church. Some within the congregation participate in community service opportunities that are not connected to the church.

Building Identity Connections: HCC is a small congregation with an average attendance of 81. Attendance has declined in the last five years. There are more women than men and the number of those 65 and older is above the UCC national average. Fifty nine percent of survey participants hold a college or advance degree which is higher than the UCC national average; 69% are married (UCC national average 52%); and 46% of survey participants have children living at home. Twentyeight percent indicated that they were always ready to try something new which is much lower than the UCC national average of 53%. Forty-one percent indicated a sense of excitement for the future. Most respondents were not sure that the vision is clear or that it exists.

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Leadership Issues: The survey participants indicated that: building a sense of community among members, worship leadership, spiritual development and pastoral care for members were tasks of highest priority for your next pastor. The lowest priorities for the next pastor were: advocating for social justice concerns, being involved in the support of world mission, investing time in developing Biblical and theological expertise. The styles of ministry priority are: to be a strong preacher; a high degree of spirituality, a warm outgoing personality, one who works hard, and thought provoking.

Worshiper's Interest: When asked what topics might they would like to be explored in future educational opportunities in their congregation the top four responses were: hunger/homelessness; Life Transitions; Grieving and Loss; and Care of Elderly. The lowest responses were: Divorce; Human Sexuality and Child Abuse.

Feedback on Congregation's Activities: When asked how satisfied they were in congregational activities the top four responses were: Holiday in Homer; Vacation Bible School; Newsletter; and Physical Facilities of the Church. The lowest responses were: Financial health and communication; outreach and integration of nonmembers; community engagement; care and visitation by church members.

Christian Education Ministry will have its next meeting on Sunday, Jan. 10 following service. We are also planning on a Reduce the Risk training for all Sunday School/nursery volunteers. Date is still TBD but mostly likely will be in February.

Highlights of the Deacons' November meeting:

- There was discussion on the delivery of communion service in the pews with a trial run in the sanctuary.
- A motion was carried, to affirm the work that Pastor Kathleen has been doing by renewing her interim pastor contract with adjustments as needed after the church council meeting on December 15th.
- There was discussion on the annual meeting and how we can make it productive and informative.
- Christmas Eve service will be a dish to pass dinner starting at 5:30pm with service following at 7:30pm.
- There was a brief discussion on the budget and explanation of the documents presented by Andrea for review.
- The financial representatives are currently using "GoToMyPC" for remote connection. This service needs to be installed on the Pastor's computer at a cost of \$114 per year to be paid by the Deacons from the "Tech Funds".
- Budget Sub Committee: Has not met yet.
 Preliminary budget will be presented at the December meeting
- Transition Team Report: On November 17, 2015 the Rev. Freeman Palmer discussed data describing our community and specific points that stuck out with regard the demographics and un-served portions of the congregation. Formal results of the US Congregational Life Survey will be conveyed December 6th following worship service. The church is about to enter phase 2 of the transition.

Committee Reports:

Stephen Ministries: There are between 6-8 persons in the congregation that have expressed interest in being trained as Stephen Ministers. There will be an informational meeting on Dec 6th after worship in the board room. Classes are tentatively going to begin at the end of January and continue for 5 months and wrap up in June. Training manuals cost \$29.95 each and a motion was made and carried for

- the deacons to pick up 50% of the cost of each participant's manual. Also there is a series of books, to be added to next year's budget. Amount will be decided upon at a later time.
- Nominating Committee: There are 3 deacon vacancies for 2016
- Poinsettias: Will be delivered by the deacons in December to the homebound

Interim Pastor's Report:

- Pastoral Care and visitation- several particular individual visited and updates reported.
- Membership Lists were updated and Jan Jeffers has the current list, which needs to be updated so that the information on membership is current with accurate numbers. The process of removing a member was discussed. Joanne offered to help with the updating.
- The Board approved a time-off request for Pastor Kathleen for the dates of December 28, 2015 through January 11, 2016.

Homer Congregational Church Fellowship Hour 2016

Thank you for hosting. It is a wonderful way to support church fellowship. We have done our best to assign everyone to a convenient date, but we realize there may be conflicts for some people. If needed contact someone else on the list and switch with them. **Please** let the church office (Donna 749-2604) know of the change so that the correct name will be in the Sunday bulletin.

There are cupboards in the kitchen that are labeled coffee hour supplies. They can be accessed from inside the kitchen or from the Russell Fellowship Room. Here you will find the following items:

Teas Sugar Powdered Creamer Stirsticks Coffee cups drink cups

Some paper plates and napkins

You may use the large platters, bowls, pitchers, baskets, and silverware found in other kitchen cupboards. Tablecloths (if desired): you may use your own or you may use the church's, which can be found in the drawers immediately to the left of the coffee maker (by the Russell Fellowship Room windows).

Items you will need

Beverage (juice, milk, water, punch, etc.) Things to eat Other paper plates and napkins.

Please don't feel like you need to bake. Store bought-items are fine. There are typically 20-50 people at fellowship hour. Don't worry if you don't have a lot. It is not a meal, just enough for people to have a bite and chat.

It works best to set everything up before the service then come out during the last hymn to serve up drinks and finish setting up, if needed. If the coffee -machine is not plugged in when you arrive please do that first. It takes about 15 minutes to warm up. There are instructions taped to the coffee machine and everything you need is right there. Just ask someone if you need help. Once the coffee is made it can go on the table along with the cups, sugar, creamer, and stir sticks. Usually 1 carafe of regular coffee and 1 carafe of decaf is sufficient. If you would like to serve tea you will need to start hot water in a percolator Marked H_2O and found in kitchen cabinets next to the swinging door of the kitchen. Filling with water and plugging it in before the service ensures you will have hot water when church is over.

Once Fellowship Hour is over, please wash and clean up any dishes used and wipe the tables. Towels can be found in the drawers to the right of the ovens. If you used a tablecloth or towels, please take these home, wash them, and return them to the drawers. If you have questions please call Belinda Burtner (756-2454) or Kathy McKenna (756-0915).

Again, thank you for hosting. Many hands make light work.
