## Keeping Confidences Stephen Ministry



Confidentiality, as you may have read or heard before, is a cornerstone of Stephen Ministry. What a care receiver says to his or her Stephen Minister is kept in strictest confidence. Even the identity of a care receiver is kept secret (unless the care receiver chooses to tell someone). Confidentiality gives care receivers the reassurance they need so that they can risk revealing to their Stephen Ministers their deepest thoughts and feelings, details they might not be able to discuss with anyone else. It is through the sharing of innermost feelings that God can work the miracle of healing, restoring faith and hope to care receivers' lives. Without the assurance of confidentiality, most care receivers would have a difficult time opening up, which would impede the healing process.

How does this relate to you, as a member of Homer Congregational Church? Even if you are not a Stephen Minister, think about the importance of confidentiality in your day-to-day relationships. Consider how you can improve relationships and help people's personal healing by maintaining confidentiality when something is told to you. When someone shares a personal feeling, a thought that is troubling him or her, or something for which he or she might feel guilty, it can be very tempting to pass that information along to someone. Even when motives are noble (for instance, wanting to pass the information along as a prayer request), it could be

damaging or painful to the person who first shared the information. If you really believe it is something that needs to be passed along – to a prayer chain, pastor, Stephen Leader, or someone else who could help – tell that to the person who shared it. Explain why you believe others should know, and encourage him or her to pass it along to the appropriate person(s). Or get permission from the individual for you to share the information yourself.

You also can play a part in helping our Stephen Ministry remain confidential. If you hear through the grapevine who a particular Stephen Minister's care receiver might be (because a care receiver has revealed this, for example), remember the Stephen Ministers' pledge to confidentiality and the important reasons for it. Refrain from asking a Stephen Minister about the caring relationship or from making comments or observations (however helpful they might appear) about someone you suspect is a care receiver. It puts a Stephen Minister in a very difficult spot when someone asks about a care receiver (whether or not it even is the Stephen Minister's care receiver). If you have a question about how a possible care receiver might be doing, ask that person him – or herself. A personal expression of concern from you probably would make that person feel good and would show that someone else really cared.

Confidentiality is a standard of conduct all of us need to live by – not just those involved in our Stephen Ministry. Confidentiality promotes trust, builds one another up, and encourages healing in a Christian community. As Solomon says in Proverbs 12:18: "Reckless words pierce like a sword, but the tongue of the wise brings healing."

## **Senior Fellowship Club**

Next meeting: September 13

The Senior Fellowship Club met on Tuesday, June 14, 2016 amidst flowers and flags in celebration of Flag Day. We welcomed and presented Rachel Ditch to the club and are delighted that she will be assisting us with future programs. Rachel opened our meeting with a prayer for all the victims of the terrible shooting in Orlando. We then paid tribute to Doc Potter on his forthcoming 98th(WOW)birthday and naturally sang Happy Birthday to him.

In honor of "Flag Day" we reviewed its history. The idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the flag is believed to have originated in 1885 when a schoolteacher in a Fredonia, Wisconsin Public School arranged for his pupils to observe June 14th (the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of the Stars and Stripes)as "Flag Birthday" or "Flag Day". The idea caught fire and other schools began to enthusiastically celebrate "Flag Day". Adults, too, began to participate. President Woodrow Wilson established the day with an official Proclamation in 1916. While "Flag Day" was celebrated in various communities, it was not until 1949 that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as "National Flag Day".

We also recalled that our "Pledge of Allegiance" has undergone several changes since the words were first written. As you know, the addition of the words "under God" in 1954 has never ceased to anger secularists and atheists, and our flag has been reviled, burned, and stamped on by subsequent generations of Americans. Many refused to say the pledge to the flag. Our club members who grew up with reverence and respect for our flag stood up on Tuesday and enthusiastically saluted our flag. We knew all the words too. We then paused to enjoy delectable refreshments prepared by Nita Baldwin, Ann Barnes, and Gwen Hayne. Many thanks, ladies, for the delicious treat.

Jan Jeffers was our special guest and presented an interesting and informative report on "Homer in the 1800's". Jan grew up in Homer and her family background is closely connected to the Village of Homer.



Jan said that the Homer area was originally a military tract of over one million acres to be divided into farm lots and issued to Revolutionary War veterans and enlisted men of the state militia. In 1791 The

Thomas Beebe Family built the first home, a pole cabin near the river. A boulder rests on the corner of No. Main St. and Hooker Ave. in the village the probable site of that cabin. By 1810, Homer had grown to 3,000 inhabitants and the village was chartered in 1835.

Jan discussed several of the earliest homes scattered around the village and pointed out the many stately homes in Homer and their prominent owners. She mentioned the Jebidiah Barber Home on No. Main St. not far from The Great Western Store, Barber's thriving business at the time, the David Harum House, and the "Hedges" on South Main. Jan indicated that Homer was the birthplace of many notable people.. Andrew D. White who became President of Cornell University, Amelia Bloomer, Andrew Stoddard who became one of Lincoln's secretaries and Francis B. Carpenter, the famous artist whose homestead was on Rte. 11, just north of the village. His most famous painting is of President Lincoln and his cabinet signing "The Emancipation Proclamation".

Jan related many other stories about early settlers. their homes, their accomplishments, and their descendents. Many thanks to Jan for such a comprehensive and thorough portrayal of "Homer in the 1800's" and reminding us all of Homer's proud legacy.

We will not be meeting during July and August, and I wish you all a wonderful summer respite. Hope we can resume in the fall.

## United Church of Christ News Commentary: Orlando: Anger, Rage and Profound Grief

The United Church of Christ deplores the violence that ended the lives of 49 beautiful people this past weekend. Even more intolerable is the apparent motive to target members of the LGBTQ community, who continue to live with the fear of ever present danger.

Especially concerning to the United Church of Christ are those brands and expressions of Christianity that demonize the LGBTQ community. When religion is used as a shield for homophobia, and when religious leaders spew forth hatred, judgment and condemnation: they create a context in which such violence is cultivated.

We want to express our profound grief on behalf of those friends and family members most affected by this violence; and who in the days to come will either be burying loved ones or attending to their physical and emotional wounds.

But what we feel and wish to express goes far beyond deep grief. There is also enormous anger and profound rage that once again beautiful and innocent people have been violated in this horrible way; and that homophobia continues to threaten the safety and sanctity of another person's right to pursue happiness.

The United Church of Christ again calls for America to act swiftly to produce gun legislation that lowers the risk that someone with an agenda, a distorted view of humanity, a proclivity for violence, and access to automatic weapons can wreak such havoc and destroy so many lives.

We are fast growing numb to the experience of processing our collective grief around these mass murders. Political and civic leaders across this country must galvanize our grief and anguish and take direct action to regulate a gun industry that has grown far too powerful.

Likewise, religious leaders must stop hiding behind archaic and abusive renderings of their sacred writings as the rationale for their homophobia. We know enough now to see that such beliefs do not reflect the will of the one we call Holy. We know enough now to understand that homophobia, racism, violence against women, sexism, xenophobia and other means of stigmatizing and discriminating against people who are different are all connected. We know enough now to declare that all God's children are beautiful and beloved. A Christianity that suggests anything less than that is no longer defensible, and must accept some culpability for any action meant to do harm to or perpetrate violence against any gay, lesbian, transgender, or bisexual person.
