From your senior pastor's mind and heart...

Grace and peace to you, dear family and friends of Homer Congregational United Church of Christ.

As I write to you this month, it strikes me that both Disciple Bible Study groups are studying about Moses. Remember how he was, by birth, the son of Hebrew people? In a time when a generation of Hebrew babies was being eliminated, Moses was delivered and became the son of Pharaoh's daughter. He received the best of everything that Egypt could offer, including education. When Moses became an adult, God called him to lead the Israelites away from slavery and into a deeper covenant with God. In the wilderness, a new generation was born. Under Moses' leadership, God's people acquired skills for survival and policies that helped them live together in community. They codified their worship. They sought and were given a new vision, a new pathway.

Soon, our Deacons will be on retreat. They will come away from the busy-ness of life. They will pray. They might write some poetry. Like our ancient role models, they will look to God and to one another for a new pathway. Like those ancient people, we are all looking for God's Way in our lives. We are finding the ways to live together in community. We are seeking a new vision.

Our society seems to have lost the ability to disagree without labeling the other as *enemy*. In these next weeks and months, we invite you to think and pray about finding God's Way – as individuals and as a church. What shall we DO in order to reflect God's love and grace, revealed by Jesus? How can we demonstrate respect even while welcoming everyone? What steps can we take to live with more love than fear? Are we living the priorities expressed by Jesus' Way, and if not, what needs to change? What keeps us relevant within the current society? How, indeed, can we BE the people of God toward one another, within our community, our nation, our world?

It promises to be an exciting chapter in the life of Homer Congregational United Church of Christ. If you have been away, come on home and join us. If you have been in the pews, stay with us and invite others to come. We are in this together.

Who is God calling us to be? Think about it. Pray about it.

From our associate pastor for faith formation...

When I was young I played a lot of “cops and robbers” and “Star Trek.” I was always one of the “good guys” either pretending to be a police officer, or the captain of my own starship. No matter which one I pretended, I always carried a toy gun or phaser. But that was then. This is now a time of mass shootings; school shootings; police officers murdering young, unarmed black men; and many others using guns to “solve” their problems.

So what do you do when you lead a group of youth who want to go to places like laser tag or paint ball? Do you take them and just let it be? Do you simply refuse to have a church youth group do something like that? Is there another solution? These are the questions I have wrestled with ever since our youth brainstormed fun activity ideas months ago; including the two I mentioned.

Ultimately, we went to laser tag. But not before we had a conversation. It was a conversation about guns, the difference between imaginative fun versus reality, and how terrible it is that human beings use guns to try to solve their problems; ultimately harming or killing others. I explained to them that while I would be comfortable doing laser tag as “pretend fun”, I would not be okay with it devolving into the notion that we are “killing” each other. Nor am I comfortable with a church youth group going to paint ball, because it involves actually hitting other people with projectiles that leave welts and other bruises. I knew the youth and I were on the same page not just by the “Yeah, duh, Pastor Gary” looks on their faces, but also because they repeated the “this is just pretend” mantra as we entered the laser tag arena.

Great, right? On some level. The other part of this story is that I also had a 1-1 conversation with one of our teens, who shared with me the fear of going to school, because of the daily risk of another school shooting; especially when the places that have already suffered this terrible tragedy were largely unknown before the deadly event—just as Homer and Cortland are currently largely unknown. We also talked about our shared gratefulness for our school resource officers, and our hope that our children always remain safe.

My take-away is that we need to continue this conversation; not just with our youth, but among our adults too. It’s a conversation that should include many layers—the feelings of our young people about school safety, the place of guns in our society, how we teach about the value of all human life, and the ways we resolve conflict and reconcile our pain, among many other things.

I know this will not be the last conversation of this kind that I have with our youth. And I also know that if we can always point toward the kind of hope and peace and non-violence that Jesus’ preached and practiced, then we will be steering not only our children, but everyone in our community, in the right direction.

Children’s Faith Formation

Our children will begin the month by taking a field trip! Since September, our children have been contributing to our weekly offering as part of the beginning of each class. In order to teach them that their generosity has an impact, during the March 3 class we will be heading to Williams IGA in the village of Homer to purchase various items for the Homer UMC food pantry. We will also deliver them that day. During the remaining Sundays of the month, children will learn about Jesus’ temptation in the desert, how Jesus wants to bring people together, and about God’s promise of abundant life as told to the prophet Isaiah. Classes are open to children in kindergarten through eighth grade, and all are welcome!



Youth Group will meet in Homer on the 17th for an “Irish Party” (why not, it’s Saint Patty’s day, lads and lassies!). The we will meet again in Preble on March 31. Looking ahead to April, our youth lead the “Way of the Cross” on The Green on Good Friday, April 19. Each Youth Group gathering includes food, faith, and fun, and all youth in grades 6 to 12 are welcome!

The Outreach Team will be collecting a free will offering on **Sunday, March 3** and at the Shrove Tuesday dinner on March 5 to support the Small Comforts Foundation. **Small Comforts** is a local, non-profit "working quietly to help meet the 'small comfort' needs of the disabled and chronically ill who live on a limited budget in Tompkins and Cortland Counties." They aim to raise the morale and quality of life of the chronically ill living at home, in an assisted living facility, or in hospice.

Some examples of items or services they have provided include: air purifiers or air conditioners for those living with lung cancer or COPD; recliners for patients who require constant leg elevation; hospital bed sheets; incontinence garments; and bus fare to enable patients to travel for treatment.

The Outreach Team strives to meet the needs of our community, show support and care for all people, and offer hope. Small Comforts' mission aligns well to ours, and we would like to support them. Thank you in advance for your generosity.
